

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


Fig. 2. Transient thermal impedance from junction to ambient as a function of pulse duration; typical values




Fig. 3. Transient thermal impedance from junction to ambient as a function of pulse duration; typical values






Fig. 4. DC current gain as a function of collector current; typical values

Fig. 5. Collector current as a function of collectoremitter voltage; typical values

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

Fig. 6. Base-emitter voltage as a function of collector current; typical values





Fig. 7. Base-emitter saturation voltage as a function of collector current; typical values







Fig. 9. Collector-emitter saturation voltage as a function of collector current; typical values

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


